2025 Henley Passport Index - Key Highlights

1. Introduction

- The Henley Passport Index (HPI) is a global ranking of passports based on the number of destinations their holders can access without a prior visa.
- Launched in 2005 by Henley & Partners, a global citizenship and residence advisory firm.
- It is **updated annually** using **data from the International Air Transport Association (IATA)**.
- The index reflects the **travel freedom** and **international mobility** of citizens across 199 countries.

2. Purpose and Methodology

- Measures the number of countries a passport holder can enter without a visa, or with visa on arrival / electronic travel authorization (eTA).
- Indicates the **extent of diplomatic relations**, **economic influence**, and **geopolitical openness** of nations.
- Used by:
 - Governments for policy analysis.
 - Businesses for global mobility planning.
 - Individuals to assess ease of international travel.

3. India's Passport Ranking in 2025

- Rank: 85th (down from 80th in 2024).
- **Visa-free access:** 57 countries (declined from 59 last year).
- Reflects a **slight dip** in global mobility for Indian citizens.
- Peak rank: 71 (in 2006).
- Lowest rank: 90 (in 2021).

Visa-Free Destinations for India (Examples)

- Asian neighbours: Bhutan, Nepal, Indonesia.
- Island nations: Mauritius, Trinidad & Tobago.
- Africa & Middle East: Senegal, Kenya (visa on arrival).

Visa-on-Arrival Access (Examples)

• Sri Lanka, Maldives, Jordan, Qatar (27 countries total).

4. Comparison with South Asian Neighbours

Country	Rank (2025)	Visa-Free Access
India	85	57
Bhutan	92	50
Bangladesh	100	38
Nepal	101	36
Pakistan	103	31

Analysis:

- India performs **moderately** in South Asia.
- Bhutan's passport shows relatively better regional mobility, indicating its stronger diplomatic ties.
- Pakistan and Bangladesh continue to rank among the lowest globally due to security and diplomatic constraints.

5. Global Leaders in 2025

Key Insight:

- Asian dominance continues, led by Singapore, South Korea, and Japan reflecting their stable diplomacy and strong economic ties.
- European nations remain consistent in the top ranks due to political stability and Schengen privileges.

6. Decline of the United States Passport

- Rank: 12th (first time out of top 10 in 20 years).
- Visa-free access: 180 countries.
- Openness ranking: 77th (only 46 countries can enter the US visa-free).
- Reason for decline:
 - Reciprocal restrictions due to limited US visa openness.
 - Countries like Brazil, China, and Vietnam reinstated visa requirements for US citizens.
 - Growing global resentment towards restrictive US visa policies.

Impact:

- Reflects a reduced soft power and diplomatic reciprocity of the US.
- Indicates a **shift in global mobility leadership** from West to Asia.

7. Countries with Weakest Passports (2025)

Reasons for Weakness:

- Political instability
- Ongoing conflicts
- Poor diplomatic outreach
- Security concerns

8. Significance of the Index

Acts as a barometer of global openness and geopolitical relations.

- Reflects citizenship privilege disparity i.e., "passport inequality."
- Useful for:
 - Foreign policy analysis
 - Migration and investment trends
 - Tourism and trade facilitation studies

9. Trends and Takeaways for UPSC

- Shift from Western to Asian dominance rise of Singapore, Japan, South Korea.
- India's slow but steady improvement since 2021, though minor setbacks remain.
- **US decline** highlights changing global diplomatic dynamics.
- Global South passports still face mobility inequality.
