

46th Chess Olympiad 2026: India's Performance and UPSC Relevance

The **46th FIDE Chess Olympiad** was held in **Samarkand, Uzbekistan, from 16 to 27 September 2026**. The prestigious team event brought together **400 teams—208 in the Open section and 192 in the Women's section**—making it the largest Olympiad field to date.

For UPSC aspirants, the event is relevant not only as a sports current-affairs topic but also for understanding **India's growing global presence in chess, sports development, youth talent and soft power**.

What is the Chess Olympiad?

The **Chess Olympiad** is the premier international team competition organised by **FIDE (International Chess Federation)**.

Unlike individual chess tournaments, countries participate as teams. The competition has separate **Open and Women's sections**, with teams playing multiple rounds under a team-based scoring system.

The 46th edition featured **11 classical rounds** in Samarkand.

India's Performance in 2026

India entered the 2026 Olympiad as the **defending champion in both sections**, following its historic double-gold performance at the **2024 Olympiad in Budapest**.

India finished the 2026 competition with:

- **Silver - Open Section**
- **Bronze - Women's Section**
- **Nona Gaprindashvili Trophy - Best Combined Performance**

India therefore remained on the podium in **both sections**.

Open Section

Uzbekistan won gold, while India secured silver and Germany took bronze.

India finished with **18 match points**, level with Germany, but secured second place on the tiebreak. Uzbekistan dominated the tournament with **20 points from 11 rounds**.

The Indian team included leading players such as **Arjun Erigaisi, Praggnanandhaa,**

Nihal Sarin, Gukesh Dommaraju and Vidit Gujrathi.

Women's Section

China won gold, Kazakhstan took silver and India won bronze after a 2-2 draw against Georgia in the final round.

India's **Savitha Shri B** also secured the individual gold medal on Board 5.

Nona Gaprindashvili Trophy

An important fact for UPSC aspirants is the **Nona Gaprindashvili Trophy**.

It is awarded to the federation with the **best combined performance in the Open and Women's sections**.

India retained the trophy in 2026. This was India's **third consecutive victory** in the combined standings, following its performances at **Chennai 2022, Budapest 2024 and Samarkand 2026**.

Why is Chess Important for India?

India's recent achievements reflect the country's growing strength in international chess.

The rise of players such as **Gukesh, Arjun Erigaisi, Praggnanandhaa, Vaishali, Divya Deshmukh and others** demonstrates the increasing depth of Indian chess.

Chess also contributes to:

- Youth development
- Analytical and strategic thinking
- International sports diplomacy
- India's soft power
- Development of sports ecosystems
- Promotion of India as a global chess hub

The continued success of young players is particularly significant because chess requires a combination of **training infrastructure, coaching, competitive exposure and long-term talent development**.

Chess and India's Soft Power

Sports can contribute to a country's **soft power** by creating international visibility and strengthening people-to-people connections.

India's growing chess profile is supported by its history, large player base, strong domestic competitions and international achievements.
