He further expressed confidence that the **Virgin Coconut Oil from Andaman & Nicobar** would soon gain international recognition, thanks to the dedicated efforts of **women's self-help groups**.

Historic Moment: Seven GI Tags for Andaman & Nicobar at Once

For the first time in Indian history, seven products from any Union Territory—in this case, the Andaman & Nicobar Islands—were granted GI tags simultaneously. This achievement was made possible with the support of the National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD) and the Andaman & Nicobar Administration.

The NGO Human Welfare Association, under the leadership of Padma Shri Rajani Kant, played a crucial role in coordinating the entire process. Rajani Kant, often referred to as the 'GI Man of India', has been instrumental in securing GI tags for 155 products across 21 states and Union Territories.

1. Nicobar Coconut

- A native coconut variety from Nicobar Islands, known for its high oil content and rich flavor.
- Cultivated using traditional tribal farming methods, ensuring its organic quality.

2. Nicobari Tavi-i-Ngaich (Virgin Coconut Oil)

- Extracted from **fresh coconuts** using a **cold-pressing method**, retaining **nutritional benefits**.
- Used for medicinal, cosmetic, and culinary purposes, prized for its purity and quality.
- With the **GI tag**, efforts are being made to enhance **branding and international marketing**.

3. Andaman Karen Musley Rice

- A traditional rice variety cultivated by the Karen tribe, known for its unique aroma, taste, and high nutritional value.
- Cultivated using organic farming techniques, ensuring pesticide-free production.

4. Nicobari Hodi (Outrigger Canoe)

- A handcrafted traditional canoe used by Nicobari tribals for fishing and transport.
- Built from durable wood, featuring a unique design that enhances stability in rough waters.
- The GI tag helps in **preserving the traditional craftsmanship** of the Nicobari people.

5. Nicobari Mat (Chatrai-Hileuoi)

- An intricately woven mat made by Nicobari women using natural plant fibers.
- Known for its fine weaving patterns and durability, often used for ceremonial purposes.
- The GI recognition aims to support tribal artisans and promote local handicrafts.

6. Nicobari Hut (To Chanvi Pati - Nyi Hupul)

- A traditional hut architecture unique to Nicobar, designed to withstand cyclones and harsh weather conditions.
- Constructed using **bamboo**, **palm leaves**, **and wood**, demonstrating **indigenous engineering expertise**.
- GI tag helps in preserving this eco-friendly architectural tradition.

7. Padauk Wood Craft

- Made from Padauk wood, a rare red-colored hardwood found in Andaman forests.
- Used to craft furniture, sculptures, and intricate carvings, showcasing local craftsmanship.
- GI status ensures sustainable use of forest resources while promoting handicraft artisans.

The recognition of these seven indigenous products under the Geographical Indication (GI) tag marks a significant step in preserving the unique cultural and economic identity of the Andaman & Nicobar Islands.
