

# Common Mistakes to Avoid During CDS 2027 Preparation

Preparing for the **CDS 2027 examination** requires more than simply studying for long hours. Many aspirants work hard but lose marks because of poor planning, lack of revision, insufficient practice or mistakes in examination strategy.

The CDS written examination includes **English, General Knowledge and Elementary Mathematics for IMA, INA and AFA**, while OTA candidates have English and General Knowledge. Since the papers are objective in nature, accuracy and time management are particularly important.

## 1. Starting Preparation Without Understanding the Syllabus

One of the biggest mistakes is beginning preparation without properly understanding the CDS syllabus.

Before starting, identify:

- Subjects applicable to your academy
- Important topics in each subject
- Difficulty level
- Previous year question trends
- Time available before the examination

A clear understanding of the syllabus helps you avoid spending excessive time on less important topics.

## 2. Using Too Many Books and Study Materials

Collecting multiple books does not mean better preparation.

For example, a candidate who is comfortable with English may spend hours improving it while completely neglecting Mathematics or GK.

Identify your **weak subjects early** and allocate additional practice time to them.

## 6. Not Practising Mathematics Regularly

For IMA, INA and AFA candidates, Mathematics is part of the written examination and is based on the matriculation level.

Reading formulas is not enough. Practise regularly:

- Percentage

- Profit and Loss
- Ratio and Proportion
- Time and Work
- Time, Speed and Distance
- Algebra
- Geometry
- Trigonometry
- Mensuration

Regular practice improves both **speed and accuracy**.

## 7. Ignoring Mock Tests

Some aspirants study the complete syllabus but take very few mock tests.

This is a major mistake.

Mock tests help improve:

- Time management
- Question selection
- Accuracy
- Exam confidence
- Speed
- Understanding of weak areas

After every mock test, spend time analysing your mistakes rather than simply checking your score.

## 8. Not Reviewing Mistakes

Making mistakes during practice is normal. Repeating the same mistake is the real problem.

Maintain a **mistake notebook** and record:

- Incorrect questions
- Difficult concepts
- Frequently forgotten facts
- Calculation errors
- Vocabulary mistakes
- Questions that consumed too much time

Revise this notebook regularly.

## 9. Ignoring Negative Marking

CDS has negative marking for incorrect answers. Therefore, avoid random guessing.

During mock tests, develop the habit of carefully deciding which questions to attempt and which ones to leave.

**Accuracy should always be prioritised over unnecessary attempts.**

## **10. Studying for Long Hours Without a Plan**

Studying for 8–10 hours does not guarantee success.

Instead of focusing only on the number of hours, focus on **productive study time**.

A good daily routine should include:

**Concept Learning → Practice → PYQs → Mock Tests → Analysis → Revision**

Even 4–6 focused hours can be highly productive when followed consistently.

## **11. Leaving Revision for the Last Month**

Many aspirants spend months learning new topics but don't revise them properly.

Revision should happen throughout your preparation.

Use:

- Weekly revision
- Monthly revision
- Short notes
- Formula sheets
- Vocabulary lists
- Current affairs revision
- Previous year questions

**What you revise repeatedly is what you are more likely to remember during the examination.**

## **12. Ignoring Time Management**

Knowing the answer is not enough if you cannot solve the paper within the allotted time.
