- Natural vs artificial lakes
- Important wetlands (Ramsar sites)

- Major river deltas and estuaries

(a) Continents & Physiographic Features

- Major mountain ranges: Andes, Rockies, Alps, Atlas, Ural

Highly important for Prelims.
