This checks whether you actually learned from the mistake.

The AFCAT PYQ Analysis Method

Use this simple cycle:

Attempt → Analyse → Identify → Revise → Reattempt

This is much more effective than simply solving paper after paper.

How to Use Previous Year Papers for English

English preparation can benefit greatly from previous-year practice.

Look for recurring question types such as:

- Synonyms
- Antonyms
- Idioms
- One-word substitutions
- Error detection
